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
Division Video Library

AP Achievement Program

To most NMRA members, the NMRA Achievement Program (AP) is a way to achieve the Master Model Railroader (MMR) status. You must earn 7 certificates in 4 different categories (model railroad equipment, settings, engineering and operation, service to the hobby). Each category is broken down into subcategories as follows:

- Model railroad equipment
 - Motive Power
 - Cars
- Settings
 - Structures
 - Scenery
 - Prototype Models
- Engineering and Operation
 - o Civil Engineer
 - o Electrical Engineer
 - Chief Dispatcher
- Service to the Hobby
 - Association Official
 - Association Volunteer
 - Author

Obtaining the MMR status can be a daunting task. It takes commitment and many hours to achieve. The process is well worth the effort. I am currently going through the process and have spent countless hours achieving 5 AP certificates and 3 merit awards towards a 6th certificate, structures. I feel that going through this process has made me a better modeler in many ways. I only wish I could have saved that switch tower that I made from cardboard or even the Revell models that I built when I was knee-high to a grasshopper so that I can compare it to the models that I'm building now.

You can find more information about the Achievement Program at http://nmra.org and click on the Education tab. If you have further questions, feel free to contact me. My contact information is listed in the Division Leadership section of this newsletter.

If you don't feel like this is "your cup of tea", then at least consider earning a Golden Spike Award. Unlike the AP, you don't need to have your models judged nor do you have to earn 7 certificates. You just need to have built a layout that meets certain requirements:

- Display 6 pieces of rolling stock. These can be scratch built, craftsman kit, super detailed commercial kits.
- Construct a minimum of 8 square feet of model railroad or module(s) including scenery in any scale.
- Construct 5 structures. These can be scratch built, craftsman kit, or super-detailed commercial kits. If a module has less than five structures, additional structures separate from the scene may be presented.
- Three types of tracks are required (turnout, crossing, cross-over, etc.). All tracks must be properly ballasted and installed on proper roadbed. Commercial track can be used.
- The track must be wired so that 2 trains can be operated simultaneously.
- One additional electrical feature must be used. This can be powered turnouts, turnout indicators, lighted building, signaling, etc.

Most of you may already qualify for a Golden Spike Award. If you think you do qualify for a Golden Spike, fill out the attached form and contact me. I will come to your layout to see if you qualify. Please message me at ap@trainfest.com.

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Just Another Ferroequinologist

(Rail Fan)

The word, Ferroequinologist comes from the Latin words ferrum ("iron") and equus ("horse") and the English word logist or one who studies. So, a ferroequinologist is one who studies iron horses or trains.

For so many, like George Robbins, the interest in ferroequinology began early in life. George received his first American Flyer as a first grader. Later, George and his brother moved onto modeling HO while in high school. 1979 brought in the next transition when George began building in N-Scale with a Bachmann set and George has been an N-Scale modeler ever since.

The current N-Scale railroad is the Capitol, Appleton and Western and represents the fourth version of the railroad. It displays a short line in no specific location. Over 100 hand painted and lettered locomotives and rolling stock for this railroad have been combined with a mixture of cars from many other railroads. Presently, George has over 500 locomotives and cars on the layout. All rolling stock are weathered and have microtrains or compatible couplers.

The layout is an L-shaped dog bone with a single track mainline and various passing sidings and two small yards. It measures 14 feet by 15 feet with a staging yard of 3 feet by 11 inches to store the rolling stock. The layout is DCC powered with block controls and tethered controllers. Two trains on the main layout and one train in staging can be run on the layout. Currently, George is working on completing the scenery on the layout and finishing the wiring both for the controls and lighting.

In addition to this layout, George has a portable figure-8 layout that is displayed throughout the year, at the various shows hosted by the club. The small layout can operate three trains on a 24 by 72-inch base and the figure-8 allows a long train to run that almost hits itself at the crossing. Two circles inside of the "8" can display shorter trains. This configuration packs a lot of action in a small space.

Over the past few years, George has been a member of the Milwaukee and Northwestern Model Railroad Club at the Oconomowoc Historical Society Museum. While working with the group, he has learned new skills such as scenery and lighting and has been exposed to DCC. At the club, George enjoys working with the other members as well as operating on other layouts. However, the most enjoyable and satisfying aspect of model railroading is bringing those skills to his home layout and successfully demonstrating them in a completed project.

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Wisconsin's First Train Wreck

On November 1st and 2nd of this year, Johnson Creek commemorated Wisconsin's first train wreck with a full schedule of events presented by the Johnson Creek Historical Museum, Jefferson Historical Museum and the Hoard Historical Museum of Fort Atkinson. Among those events was the unveiling of a marker for the 165th anniversary of the accident.

It was 1859 and by then traveling by rail was on the rise. Wisconsin was a relatively new state and fortunate to have rail lines that extended north from Chicago by the Chicago and Northwestern Road. On November 1, 1859, an 11-car free-excursion train, led by the wood-burning engine Perry H. Smith, carried over 600 passengers who were celebrating the train's maiden voyage from Oshkosh to Chicago. When it came upon a Johnson Creek bridge, about seven miles south of Watertown, it struck an angry and confused ox that was charging at the train. Since the road and railway had just been built, there wasn't time to build a fence to keep animals away. The animal was caught up on the cow-catcher and carried about a dozen rods, when it fell under the locomotive just as the train was crossing a small bridge.



The engine was thrown into a ditch, the baggage car fell over into a pool of water and five passenger cars were driven together, "shattered, smashed up and demolished." Sadly, fourteen people were killed and 30 were injured.

A coroner's jury found the accident "unavoidable," but a cry was raised to make farmers responsible for the conduct of their livestock.

A telegraph sent to the State Journal listed the dead as follows: M. J. Thomas, U.S. Marshall, Jerome Mason, Fond du Lac, telegraph operator and express agent, J. Snow, Fond du Lac, J. Boardman do, T.L. Gillett do, John Lund, Oshkosh, G.F. Emerson do, O. Tetersdale do, L. Sherwood do, Dr. T. Miner, Watertown. Those most seriously injured were V.B. Smead, the editor of the Press, Fond du Lac, skull very badly fractured, not expected to recover. E.H. Sickles, Fond du Lac, both legs off. A.D. Bonesteel, Fond du Lac, one leg broken. Robert Flint, Fond du Lac, one leg broken. Mrs. J. Radford, Fond du Lac, badly cut up. Mrs. R.M. Lewis, Fond du Lac, one leg broken. Mrs. Baldwin, Oshkosh, both legs broken. Mrs. James Kinney, Fond du Lac, one leg broken. Mrs. Bixby, Chicago, two ribs broken.

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Milwaukee & Northwestern Model Railroad At the Oconomowoc Historical Society and Museum

The Oconomowoc Historical Society Museum moved to the former National Guard Armory on June 29, 1991. Sometime in the 1990s. Mrs. Don Stewart donated her late husband's HO layout to the Museum, and this was the beginning of the Milwaukee Northwestern (Model) Railroad (MNWRR). The original layout was constructed from the 1950's through 70's and measured about 20 ft by 20 ft with a southwest theme. Initially the layout was setup, maintained and operated by a trio of volunteers. The leader of this group was a very dedicated modeler, Harry Evans. The other volunteers were Harold Misna and Rose Marie Reich. During the early years, Harry added a return loop to the east end of the layout which became Oconomowoc. Otherwise, the layout remained the same until 2007, when Harry invited Jim Bauer to visit and help with updating the layout. At this time, Jim was enrolled in several model railroading classes offered by Learning in Retirement of Waukesha County. He returned to class and told the group about the layout and that it needed a lot of help! Soon a contingent of the class were helping on Monday afternoons including Robert Niedermann, Herb Grospitz, Lee Oettinger and Chuck Gevaert. Friends of these guys soon joined the group.

It was very interesting exploring, updating and modifying the modeling techniques of the 1950's-70's era. Since we could not keep the brass track clean and trains operating, we took on the task to update the trackwork. We were reluctant to remove all the track and turnouts since it was all hand laid. However, with the addition of roadbed, nickel-silver flex track, and ballast, trains ran more reliably.

Since the layout existed in a historical museum, we decided that it needed to reflect trains traveling through Oconomowoc and Wisconsin in

the 1950s, 60s and 70s. We also wanted the ability to run six trains at one time traveling through many towns of Wisconsin on both the Milwaukee Road and Chicago Northwestern RR. To accomplish this, we needed to expand the layout and replace the southwest motif. Some of our group focused on the construction of additional benchwork while others tore out scenery and built new midwestern scenes.

Once we had six trains running, Harry Evans decided to move from his house into a condo. Because of this impending move, he donated his 8 ft x 20 ft layout to the Museum. We now needed to find a way to incorporate it into our existing layout. To accomplish this, we needed to make modifications and additions to Harry's layout and we had to move our now 25 ft x 20 ft layout three feet to the south! How do you move a layout this large that far without destroying it? Well, the Oconomowoc High School National Honor Society is always looking for volunteer projects, so we enlisted about 15 students to help us move it. A student was placed behind each leg of the layout and on the word "Go" everyone pushed their leg. It worked!

We also decided that we needed to incorporate Portage into our layout. The resulting peninsula-shaped addition measures roughly 2-1/2 ft by 25 ft. and includes a roundhouse with turntable and a large sorting yard. After completing the Portage addition, we decided that the center of the layout, which represents Butler, needed major remodeling.

We tore out the track and the benchwork of an area of about 8 ft x 8 ft and then built I-girder benchwork to support a modified track plan for Butler. The revisions greatly enhanced our ability to run operating sessions.

Recently, we added another yard area in Watertown which again helps with operating. This probably will mark the last addition to our layout. We greatly appreciate the Museum allowing us to make all these additions.

Besides Portage and Watertown we also have trains running through scenery and structures in Oconomowoc, Baraboo, Wisconsin Dells, Butler, Hillsboro and Kendall. The Museum Board greatly appreciates our efforts to model the history of Oconomowoc and its surrounding communities.

To promote the hobby of model railroading, we have a Youth Group which is supervised by four of our members - Shawn Becher, Robert and William Whitmore and Joey Smith. The group currently has 15 boys and meets on the third Sunday of each month. At these sessions, the boys learn model railroading skills, operate the layout and build modules for their portable layout.

In addition, we sponsor an annual Open House at the Museum which occurs on the first Saturday in November. At this show we have our large Museum layout running all six trains and our Youth group operates their modular layout. Also running are a portable HOn3 layout, Lionel layout, American Flyer layout, G-scale layout and two N-scale layouts. We also travel to libraries, most notably a January visit to Delafield where we have gone for the last 9 years, to do one-day shows where we run our portable layouts.

The Museum is often overlooked by people, not realizing how good it is. The layout is the most popular exhibit, but the Museum also promotes the history of Oconomowoc with a huge "Streets of Oconomowoc" exhibit featuring many of the city's historical businesses. The Museum is also often visited by local school groups and occasionally by tour groups from as far away as Germany.

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WISE Division Member Receives NMRA President's Award – Dave Nelson

Early in September a large, padded envelope from the NMRA was jammed into our mailbox. I was curious about what could possibly be inside since I had already received an acknowledgement of my donation to NMRA for the yearly address labels, and it was not yet time to renew. It sounded like there was broken glass in the envelope, so I opened it very carefully; inside was a plastic frame with, yes, some shattered glass, containing the "NMRA President's Award for Service to the Division," signed by NMRA President Gordy Robinson, MMR. There was also a cover letter from Gordy thanking me for my service to the NMRA. I was, needless to say, quite surprised. What is interesting about this award, which has been granted since 2017, is that it refers to service to the Division but only one Division member per Region is awarded. The award itself mentions service to the Division and to the Midwest Region.

The only protection for the glass frame was the thin padding on the envelope so I guess it isn't too shocking that the glass in the frame did not survive handling by the USPS. It might even have been fine until it was forced into our small mailbox.

I am not sure why I was chosen for this award and so far, nobody seems willing to actually own up to having recommended me. I've been an NMRA member for a long time but there are folks in the WISE Division with far longer tenures than mine. I have never been an officer or Board member of the Division (or the Region) but I have been a long-time volunteer for many Divisional activities. I'm a long-time Trainfest volunteer going way back to the Friday set-up in the "old" State Fair building,

I've worked the registration desk, recruited and coordinated the volunteers, and helped out at the Trainfest office during the show.

I was asked to assist Art Oseland's committee to re-write our By-laws and Constitution and helped run several of the Division's elections over the years. I served on the host committee for the 2010 NMRA National convention in Milwaukee and worked the registration table for the week. I have given many clinics (live or via Zoom) to the WISE Division (and to at least a half-dozen other divisions in the Region, as well as at Midwest Region conventions) and am currently the clinic coordinator for the WISE Division. I taught at Dave Mielke's Train School session and presented at Mike Slater's recent prototype modeling retreat in Kenosha. Since 2009 I have written the "Frugal Modeler" column for the Midwest Region's quarterly "Waybill," and have also authored some stuff for the Owl Car. I have also helped run the Division's elections. I can only assume all this volunteering is why someone thought I was worthy of the President's Award, but again there are others in the Division (and Region) with extensive records of volunteering.

I got him a warehouse tour at Walthers, and we also went to Jetco Hiawatha Hobbies where he spent some serious money.

Gordy was so captivated by Ackerville that he decided to model it (he has several layouts in more than one scale, both American and U.K. prototypes) and he's written about it on his "gordy.uk" blog. (We also sampled some interesting beers at the Cafe Hollander near the CP main in Wauwatosa.)

I know some NMRA members find Gordy's accent a bit hard to understand now and then, but my mother was born in England, so I was already accustomed to it.

Anyway, that's the story about my receiving the NMRA President's Award and I am extremely honored and grateful to receive it (shattered glass and all!).

It was not necessary because no matter what volunteering I've done for the Region or its Divisions, I was always thanked (which is very important). It is particularly nice that of all the Divisions in the Midwest Region it went to someone from the WISE Division as we continue to recover from our financial and organizational gut-punch of two years ago. Many thanks to all who brought my name forward.

There is great public access to both main lines with good photography possibilities, and Dave's clinics will highlight why Galesburg should be a Midwestern railfan's destination. He will also feature railfan and photography locations that can be enjoyed on the way to Galesburg from Wisconsin and will include some interesting displays and opportunities from Galesburg Railroad Days of the past.

Member Code of Conduct

Introduction

This Code of Conduct ("Code") has been developed to set expectations for the behaviors, conduct, communication, and interactions between you and other members, officers and directors of the National Model Railroad Association, Inc. ("NMRA"). This Code applies to all such persons when engaging with other NMRA members, participating in any event, social media platform or other sponsored extension of the NMRA (for example, the NMRA Interchange or an NMRA-sponsored online meeting) and attending NMRA meetings, events, or activities (whether National, Regional, Division or other subset). This Code also includes general guidelines on the appropriate use of social media for NMRA matters at any level.

Why do we need a code of conduct?

We join the NMRA and participate in its activities for one common reason – we enjoy the model railroading hobby and the fun, challenges, personal growth and camaraderie that it provides. It is imperative that we keep our common bond of model railroading "front and center" and rise above the inevitable differences that exist among us in personalities, opinions, experience, gender, age, race, nationality, or any of the other factors that make each of us unique individuals. Our collective goal is to enjoy and promote the hobby of model railroading, so we must strive to avoid "distractions" that interfere with or obstruct our common purpose. Collaboration and co-operation are vital for the success of our hobby and our enjoyment of model railroading and everything it has to offer.

What does the NMRA expect of members?

The NMRA expects all members to conduct themselves in a respectful, responsible, and mature manner, and demonstrate courtesy and kindness toward other individuals. Constructive and healthy discussions and interactions are encouraged and in fact are vital to the success of our hobby. However, certain other verbal and nonverbal behaviors and actions are not consistent with the NMRA's values and hurt our hobby and relationships, such as the use of disparaging language, shouting, profanity, confrontational, intimidating, or threatening behavior or language, and immature and disrespectful behavior or language. It is imperative that we interact in a polite and professional manner.

The NMRA does not condone abusive, threatening, or aggressive behavior toward anyone at an NMRA event or in an NMRA forum (such as social media and other forms of electronic and digital interaction). This includes other participants, event organizers or sponsors, judges, or other officials.

You should be welcoming to newcomers and remember they may not have the benefit of experience and information that you have enjoyed. Be constructive in helping to make their entry into the hobby an enjoyable one.

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Harassment

NMRA events and functions are meant to be fun, educational, and inclusive. No one should be subject to intimidation, made to feel unwelcome, or put in fear of reprisal. Harassment may include behavior or language that causes alarm, distress, anxiety, fear of physical violence, offensive statements, verbal abuse, and threats. Members should be sensitive to others.

Non-Retaliation

The NMRA relies on you to identify potential issues and raise concerns that the NMRA may need to address. The NMRA prohibits acts of retaliation against any person who reports an issue honestly and in good faith, and retaliation can constitute misconduct that could subject a member to discipline. This commitment to non-retaliation assures you that raising concerns, reporting misconduct, or cooperating in any investigation will not result in adverse consequences. The NMRA prohibits retaliation in any form, at any level of the organization, recognizing that retaliatory behavior contributes to an environment of mistrust and diminishes the willingness of individuals to be collaborative and transparent. During the investigation of any matter, the NMRA makes every reasonable effort to maintain the confidentiality of those involved.

Use of social media

The rapid growth of social media combined with ease of use and pervasiveness make it an attractive channel for communication. Use of social media for communication also creates the possibility of a host of unintended consequences. To help you identify and avoid potential issues, we are providing some examples of best practices that are meant to help you understand, from a wide range of perspectives, the implications of participation in social media. Any postings that you make as a representative of or participant in NMRA sanctioned activities will reflect on you and the NMRA.

Understand Your Personal Responsibility: You are personally responsible for the content you publish on user-generated content forums, such as blogs or social media sites. Remember that what you publish will be public for a long time. Protect your privacy.

Be Accurate: Be sure that you have all the facts before you post. It's better to verify your sources first than to have to post a correction or retraction later. If you do make a mistake, admit it and correct it. Post a retraction, edit your post, make any necessary apologies. If you are editing an earlier post, make it clear that you have made a correction.

Respect Others: You can catch a whole lot more flies with honey than vinegar. If you are constructive and respectful while seeking advice, asking for help, or discussing a disagreement or bad experience, you are far more likely to reach an understanding. In some instances, you may not be able to reach an understanding or agreement, but it is your responsibility to be constructive and address the problem rather than attacking the person.

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Respect Your Audience: Don't use personal insults or disparaging conduct or language toward others. Show proper consideration for others' privacy and for sensitive topics. Users are free to discuss topics and disagree with one another but be respectful of others' opinions. You are more likely to achieve your goals if you are constructive and respectful while discussing a bad experience or disagreeing with an idea or a person. Harassment is not acceptable.

Think Before You Post: There's no such thing as a "private" social media site. Search engines can turn up posts and pictures years after publication. Comments can be forwarded or copied, and screenshots are easily available. Archival systems save information even if you delete a post. If you feel angry or passionate about a subject, it's prudent to wait until you are calm and clear-headed before posting.

Does it Pass the Publicity Test? If the content of your message would not be acceptable for face-to-face conversation, over the telephone, or in another medium, it is not acceptable for a social networking site. Do not use the anonymity afforded by a social media screen name or handle to post something that you wouldn't say if you could be identified.

Take the High Ground: You are more likely to build a high quality following if you discuss ideas and situations civilly. Don't pick fights online. Remember that as a participant in NMRA programming, you are representing the NMRA, and the organization supports the principles of fun, respect, and inclusion.


Do not post information that you know (or reasonably should know) is private, confidential, or proprietary. Some information that becomes available to you may be considered private, confidential or proprietary by the owner or source of such information – think before you post and if you are unsure, check with the owner or source before posting. Do not post anything in a private forum that you would not present in any public forum because there is no true privacy on the Internet. Ask yourself if you would want to see this published in the newspaper or posted on a billboard tomorrow or ten years from now? Additionally, ask yourself if you would want to see screenshots posted to the person or persons about whom you are speaking or writing.

Be Aware of Liability: You are responsible for what you post on your own site and on the sites of others. Be sure that what you post today is not something that you will regret in the future and that you are not violating any legal guidelines. Postings on social media sites can be, and have been, the subject of lawsuits alleging defamation, slander, or libel. In such a lawsuit, a court can compel the social media platform to disclose your account information; you won't be anonymous.

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How does the NMRA enforce this code?

The NMRA can enforce this code of conduct independently, or in response to a complaint, after notice to affected members and due process including an opportunity to be heard. Proceedings include gathering facts, interviewing witnesses, conducting a hearing, and imposing discipline or dismissing the matter. The NMRA is a private membership organization; membership, member benefits, and the use of NMRA trademarks and intellectual property are not free or public. Therefore, the NMRA's leadership can determine that a violation of this code of conduct justifies a disciplinary action. Examples of actions include censure (a warning the similar conduct could cause termination), removal from an elected office, disqualification from elected offices or leadership, and termination of membership. The NMRA's Corporate Policies & Procedures Manual (CPPM), and Ohio state law applicable to nonprofit membership corporations such as the NMRA, governs the enforcement of this code and member discipline.

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Current HO Scale Car Projects N&W HC-46 ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper Arrived September 2022

Using Accurail's 2200 Series ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper as the basis, we are offering it in a Norfolk & Western repaint scheme. These cars are N&W class HC-46 and are from an original batch of fifty built by in 1966 by ACF with the Round Herald paint scheme. Subsequently some cars went through a general maintenance program and were repainted in the block N&W livery. Photos were found showing at least three of these cars (road numbers 170753, 170768 and 170794) were reweighed at some later date because that area is "patched out" on the car with the new data displayed. Those same photos place these three cars as being in service in 1992 and 2004. It is these three, highly unique, road numbers that Cincinnati Division 7 is now offering for sale as limited edition kits.


