AP Achievement Program

To most NMRA members, the NMRA Achievement Program (AP) is a way to achieve the Master Model Railroader (MMR) status. You must earn 7 certificates in 4 different categories (model railroad equipment, settings, engineering and operation, service to the hobby). Each category is broken down into subcategories as follows:

- Model railroad equipment
 - Motive Power
 - o Cars
- Settings
 - Structures
 - Scenery
 - Prototype Models
- Engineering and Operation
 - o Civil Engineer
 - o Electrical Engineer
 - Chief Dispatcher
- Service to the Hobby
 - Association Official
 - Association Volunteer
 - o Author

Obtaining the MMR status can be a daunting task. It takes commitment and many hours to achieve. The process is well worth the effort. I am currently going through the process and have spent countless hours achieving 5 AP certificates and 3 merit awards towards a 6th certificate, structures. I feel that going through this process has made me a better modeler in many ways. I only wish I could have saved that switch tower that I made from cardboard or even the Revell models that I built when I was knee-high to a grasshopper so that I can compare it to the models that I'm building now. You can find more information about the Achievement Program at http://nmra.org and click on the Education tab. If you have further questions, feel free to contact me. My contact information is listed in the Division Leadership section of this newsletter.

If you don't feel like this is "your cup of tea", then at least consider earning a Golden Spike Award. Unlike the AP, you don't need to have your models judged nor do you have to earn 7 certificates. You just need to have built a layout that meets certain requirements:

• Display 6 pieces of rolling stock. These can be scratch built, craftsman kit, super detailed commercial kits.

• Construct a minimum of 8 square feet of model railroad or module(s) including scenery in any scale.

• Construct 5 structures. These can be scratch built, craftsman kit, or super-detailed commercial kits. If a module has less than five structures, additional structures separate from the scene may be presented.

• Three types of tracks are required (turnout, crossing, cross-over, etc.). All tracks must be properly ballasted and installed on proper roadbed. Commercial track can be used.

• The track must be wired so that 2 trains can be operated simultaneously.

• One additional electrical feature must be used. This can be powered turnouts, turnout indicators, lighted building, signaling, etc.

Most of you may already qualify for a Golden Spike Award. If you think you do qualify for a Golden Spike, fill out the attached form and contact me. I will come to your layout to see if you qualify. Please message me at <u>ap@trainfest.com</u>.

- The Golden Spike Award (GSA) will be awarded to any NMRA member who completes the Qualifications Checklist, obtains the necessary signatures (Division AP Manager or some local NMRA member approved by the Division AP Manager), and if the applicant does not already hold MMR status.
- The GSA will be administered by the Division and Region AP Managers.
- AP reguirements and definitions apply for scratch building and super-detailing.
- The Division AP Manager will submit the signed form to the Region AP Manager who will issue the Golden Spike Award certificate.
- The Region AP Manager will then forward the completed form to the National AP Manager so that an announcement can be made in the NMRA Magazine.

GOLDEN SPIKE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS CHECKLIST:

1. Rolling Stock (Motive Power & Cars):

Display six units of rolling stock either scratchbuilt, craftsman kits or superdetailed commercial kits.

2. Model Railroad Setting (Structures & Scenery

- Construct a minimum of eight square feet of model railroad or module(s) including scenery in any scale.
- Construct five structures either scratchbuilt, craftsman kits or superdetailed commercial kits. If a
 - module has less than five structures, additional structures separate from the scene may be presented.

3. Engineering (Civil & Electrical)

- Three types of track are required (e.g. turnout, crossing, crossover, etc.). All must be properly ballasted and installed on proper roadbed. Commercial track may be used.
- All installed track must be properly wired so that two trains can be operated simultaneously (e.g. double track main, single track main with sidings, and block or command or other form of control).
- Provide any one additional electrical feature such as power operated turnouts, signaling, turnout indication, lighted buildings, etc.

Railroads Came to Life During Milwaukee Optoberfest

On October 18-20, 43 operators from four states enjoyed operating on 14 layouts in scales ranging from N to HO and G, as well as touring eight layouts (six on Saturday night and two on Sunday afternoon) in the Milwaukee metro, Madison metro area and Lindenhurst, IL.

Milwaukee Optoberfest got its start in 2011 and has been held every year except for 2018 and 2020. It is a free event open to local and invited operators. This year, those operators came from the La Crosse area, Fox Valley, Chicagoland, Rockford and Peoria, IL. and even as far away as Omaha, NE and Wilmington, OH. Among these participants were two local beginner operators who had the opportunity to operate during a session with experienced operators. These two plan to participate again next year

Milwaukee Optoberfest 2024 was a non-Divisional event that was held in memory of Rolf Plachter (Midwest Lines), James D. Hediger (Ohio Southern) and commemorated the now dismantled Kalmbach layout, the Milwaukee, Racine and Troy. Each participant received a commemorative sticker to honor the event.

Optobefest kicked off Friday evening with sessions in the Milwaukee area on the Ashland, Superior & Pacific (HO), BN (formerly CB&Q) Peoria Sub. (HO), Wabash & Union Belt (HO), Four Corners & Five Lakes (N) and Rock Harbor (HO). For those interested in operating on just N scale layouts, there were three N scale layouts operating on Friday and Saturday. Starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday morning operators went to work on the Wabash & Union Belt (HO), Midwest Lines (HO) and the Missabe Jct. (N). Afternoon sessions were on the Blue Mountain & Cascade (HO), Chicago, Wisconsin & Pacific (N), C&S Gunnison City (Gn3) and Rock Harbor (HO).

The day concluded with operators having a chance to tour layouts that are under construction and hopefully will be on the operating schedule next year. Saturday night also provided the opportunity to socialize and discuss the days operations over a few beverages as the operators of La Crosse and Omaha discovered at Champ's in Brookfield.

Sunday morning was an early day as those participating in Sunday sessions had to be in the Madison area by 9 a.m. to operate on the C&NW Memories (HO), Rice Lake, Dallas & Menomonie Railroad (HO) and Rio Grande Pacific (HO). Those heading south to home operated on the B&O – Fairmont, Morgantown and Pittsburgh (HO) on the other side of the state line. Those in Madison had a chance to tour two layouts before continuing their travels home.

The dates for Milwaukee Optoberfest 2025 have yet to be set but they will probably be in either early September or October.





Friends of Burlington Northern Railroad



The Friends of the Burlington Northern

Railroad's primary mission is to preserve the history and chronicle the operation of the Burlington Northern Railroad and its successors, including the Montana Rail Link. The organization strives to maintain and disseminate information and records of historical relevance from the railroad's inception in 1970 and following the merger between Burlington Northern and Santa Fe from 1996 to the present.

The historical society was incorporated in the state of Idaho on January 3, 1993. It was chartered to gather, preserve, and share information about the history and the current operations of the Burlington Northern Railroad. The group began with about 140 members absorbed by the Burlington Northern Historical Society, an un-incorporated interim organization interested in studying the history of the Burlington Northern Railroad. In 1996, following the merger between Burlington Northern and Santa Fe, the group voted to follow the Burlington Northern from 1970 to 1995 and the BNSF from 1995 to the present. Then, in 2018, coverage of the Montana Rail Link was added.

The Group's quarterly publication, <u>The BN Expediter</u>, is the voice of the organization that shares news about the group's activities, BN historical data, and

current operations of the railroad. It is currently a 30+ page all-color publication and will grow even larger as the society grows and more members contribute more information.



An archive has been created to preserve

information about the Burlington Northern and a preservation committee has been established to position itself to preserve and store artifacts as the society acquires them. The archive includes photographs, maps, books, Shareholders Reports, Labor Agreements Locomotive Shops and Facilities Information and hundreds of other documents.

Each year the **FOBNR** holds a convention and membership meeting which includes tours of local BN/BNSF facilities and other railroad-related facilities, a display of BN historical information and items, tours of local layouts (and sometimes operating sessions), railfanning opportunities, a banquet with a speaker (usually a local BNSF official), and a board meeting. The FOBNR 2025 Convention will be held in Fort Worth, Texas, June 18-21, 2025

Layout Tours

After the November Division meet at our new location at the New Berlin Public library there was a tour of the Waukesha County Gandy Dancers layout. The club is located downtown at 741 North Grand Avenue in the basement of the Social Security office. The club has been in their new space for about two years and is currently in the process of building a new permanent layout.

For our visit, Robert Sobolik had their welcome sign out for us to come on down to the layout room.



The plan is to build this layout to HO scale. It's always a daunting task to design and build a layout, but what I saw and heard from the membership leads me to believe that great layout is in the works.

The layout features a river that flows with real water and functions just like a river would. The river is located in a canyon that displays several very nicely built bridges.



There is a monster, double-tracked helix made up of Masonite with each of its 14 turns running about 30 feet long A CNW train makes its journey around this helix. At the top of the helix is a bridge that provides access to a locker area where each member can store their model equipment. However, the rails do not terminate here but continues on into a currently four track loop for the return trip down the helix.

One of the members boasts a boxcar with a speaker paired by Bluetooth to his phones' play list. This boxcar is part of his Alaskan railroad train set with a Milwaukee Road observation car also painted in Alaskan railroad colors.

It is always amazing the creativity that we exhibit when we are creating our miniature rail worlds. We take the dream and put it on paper (or computer CAD) and make it a reality.

Member Code of Conduct

Introduction

This Code of Conduct ("Code") has been developed to set expectations for the behaviors, conduct, communication, and interactions between you and other members, officers and directors of the National Model Railroad Association, Inc. ("NMRA"). This Code applies to all such persons when engaging with other NMRA members, participating in any event, social media platform or other sponsored extension of the NMRA (for example, the NMRA Interchange or an NMRA-sponsored online meeting) and attending NMRA meetings, events, or activities (whether National, Regional, Division or other subset). This Code also includes general guidelines on the appropriate use of social media for NMRA matters at any level.

Why do we need a code of conduct?

We join the NMRA and participate in its activities for one common reason – we enjoy the model railroading hobby and the fun, challenges, personal growth and camaraderie that it provides. It is imperative that we keep our common bond of model railroading "front and center" and rise above the inevitable differences that exist among us in personalities, opinions, experience, gender, age, race, nationality, or any of the other factors that make each of us unique individuals. Our collective goal is to enjoy and promote the hobby of model railroading, so we must strive to avoid "distractions" that interfere with or obstruct our common purpose. Collaboration and co-operation are vital for the success of our hobby and our enjoyment of model railroading and everything it has to offer.

What does the NMRA expect of members?

The NMRA expects all members to conduct themselves in a respectful, responsible, and mature manner, and demonstrate courtesy and kindness toward other individuals. Constructive and healthy discussions and interactions are encouraged and in fact are vital to the success of our hobby. However, certain other verbal and nonverbal behaviors and actions are not consistent with the NMRA's values and hurt our hobby and relationships, such as the use of disparaging language, shouting, profanity, confrontational, intimidating, or threatening behavior or language, and immature and disrespectful behavior or language. It is imperative that we interact in a polite and professional manner.

The NMRA does not condone abusive, threatening, or aggressive behavior toward anyone at an NMRA event or in an NMRA forum (such as social media and other forms of electronic and digital interaction). This includes other participants, event organizers or sponsors, judges, or other officials.

You should be welcoming to newcomers and remember they may not have the benefit of experience and information that you have enjoyed. Be constructive in helping to make their entry into the hobby an enjoyable one.

Harassment

NMRA events and functions are meant to be fun, educational, and inclusive. No one should be subject to intimidation, made to feel unwelcome, or put in fear of reprisal. Harassment may include behavior or language that causes alarm, distress, anxiety, fear of physical violence, offensive statements, verbal abuse, and threats. Members should be sensitive to others.

Non-Retaliation

The NMRA relies on you to identify potential issues and raise concerns that the NMRA may need to address. The NMRA prohibits acts of retaliation against any person who reports an issue honestly and in good faith, and retaliation can constitute misconduct that could subject a member to discipline. This commitment to non-retaliation assures you that raising concerns, reporting misconduct, or cooperating in any investigation will not result in adverse consequences. The NMRA prohibits retaliation in any form, at any level of the organization, recognizing that retaliatory behavior contributes to an environment of mistrust and diminishes the willingness of individuals to be collaborative and transparent. During the investigation of any matter, the NMRA makes every reasonable effort to maintain the confidentiality of those involved.

Use of social media

The rapid growth of social media combined with ease of use and pervasiveness make it an attractive channel for communication. Use of social media for communication also creates the possibility of a host of unintended consequences. To help you identify and avoid potential issues, we are providing some examples of best practices that are meant to help you understand, from a wide range of perspectives, the implications of participation in social media. Any postings that you make as a representative of or participant in NMRA sanctioned activities will reflect on you and the NMRA.

Understand Your Personal Responsibility: You are personally responsible for the content you publish on user-generated content forums, such as blogs or social media sites. Remember that what you publish will be public for a long time. Protect your privacy.

Be Accurate: Be sure that you have all the facts before you post. It's better to verify your sources first than to have to post a correction or retraction later. If you do make a mistake, admit it and correct it. Post a retraction, edit your post, make any necessary apologies. If you are editing an earlier post, make it clear that you have made a correction.

Respect Others: You can catch a whole lot more flies with honey than vinegar. If you are constructive and respectful while seeking advice, asking for help, or discussing a disagreement or bad experience, you are far more likely to reach an understanding. In some instances, you may not be able to reach an understanding or agreement, but it is your responsibility to be constructive and address the problem rather than attacking the person.

Respect Your Audience: Don't use personal insults or disparaging conduct or language toward others. Show proper consideration for others' privacy and for sensitive topics. Users are free to discuss topics and disagree with one another but be respectful of others' opinions. You are more likely to achieve your goals if you are constructive and respectful while discussing a bad experience or disagreeing with an idea or a person. Harassment is not acceptable.

Think Before You Post: There's no such thing as a "private" social media site. Search engines can turn up posts and pictures years after publication. Comments can be forwarded or copied, and screenshots are easily available. Archival systems save information even if you delete a post. If you feel angry or passionate about a subject, it's prudent to wait until you are calm and clear-headed before posting.

Does it Pass the Publicity Test? If the content of your message would not be acceptable for face-to-face conversation, over the telephone, or in another medium, it is not acceptable for a social networking site. Do not use the anonymity afforded by a social media screen name or handle to post something that you wouldn't say if you could be identified.


Take the High Ground: You are more likely to build a high quality following if you discuss ideas and situations civilly. Don't pick fights online. Remember that as a participant in NMRA programming, you are representing the NMRA, and the organization supports the principles of fun, respect, and inclusion.

Do not post information that you know (or reasonably should know) is private, confidential, or proprietary. Some information that becomes available to you may be considered private, confidential or proprietary by the owner or source of such information – think before you post and if you are unsure, check with the owner or source before posting. Do not post anything in a private forum that you would not present in any public forum because there is no true privacy on the Internet. Ask yourself if you would want to see this published in the newspaper or posted on a billboard tomorrow or ten years from now? Additionally, ask yourself if you would want to see screenshots posted to the person or persons about whom you are speaking or writing.

Be Aware of Liability: You are responsible for what you post on your own site and on the sites of others. Be sure that what you post today is not something that you will regret in the future and that you are not violating any legal guidelines. Postings on social media sites can be, and have been, the subject of lawsuits alleging defamation, slander, or libel. In such a lawsuit, a court can compel the social media platform to disclose your account information; you won't be anonymous.


How does the NMRA enforce this code?

The NMRA can enforce this code of conduct independently, or in response to a complaint, after notice to affected members and due process including an opportunity to be heard. Proceedings include gathering facts, interviewing witnesses, conducting a hearing, and imposing discipline or dismissing the matter. The NMRA is a private membership organization; membership, member benefits, and the use of NMRA trademarks and intellectual property are not free or public. Therefore, the NMRA's leadership can determine that a violation of this code of conduct justifies a disciplinary action. Examples of actions include censure (a warning the similar conduct could cause termination), removal from an elected office, disqualification from elected offices or leadership, and termination of membership. The NMRA's Corporate Policies & Procedures Manual (CPPM), and Ohio state law applicable to nonprofit membership corporations such as the NMRA, governs the enforcement of this code and member discipline.



Current HO Scale Car Projects N&W HC-46 ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper Arrived September 2022

Using Accurail's 2200 Series ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper as the basis, we are offering it in a Norfolk & Western repaint scheme. These cars are N&W class HC-46 and are from an original batch of fifty built by in 1966 by ACF with the Round Herald paint scheme. Subsequently some cars went through a general maintenance program and were repainted in the block N&W livery. Photos were found showing at least three of these cars (road numbers 170753, 170768 and 170794) were reweighed at some later date because that area is "patched out" on the car with the new data displayed. Those same photos place these three cars as being in service in 1992 and 2004. It is these three, highly unique, road numbers that Cincinnati Division 7 is now offering for sale as limited edition kits.
